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DOL Proposes rule to reflect current construction industry

For the first time in 40 years, the Davis-Bacon Act will be updated

It's big news when a regulation receives the most comprehensive review than it has in the past 40 years. That's the case for Davis-Bacon and Related Acts.

To better reflect the needs of workers in the construction industry and planned federal construction investments, on March 22, the DOL announced the publication of a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking as it considers updating the regulations that implement the Davis-Bacon Act and Related Acts.

The proposal seeks to speed up prevailing wage updates, creating several efficiencies in the current system and ensuring prevailing wage rates keep up with actual wages. Over time, this would mean higher wages for workers.

"Federal dollars should be used to create good jobs in local communities all across our country," said Secretary of Labor Marty Walsh, in a statement. "These proposed regulations are good for workers, good for building high-quality infrastructure and for ensuring we have a strong construction industry, as we rebuild America."

There are 71 DBRA laws applicable to federal and federally assisted construction projects that require the payment of locally prevailing wage rates for 1.2 million U.S. construction workers. The requirements currently cover approximately \$187 billion in federal spending on construction each year.

The DBRA requirements also protect workers under the unprecedented federal investments in infrastructure across the country. These projects involve clean energy, power and water infrastructure improvements, legacy pollution

remediation, and renovation to the nation's broadband and transportation infrastructures.

Many of the proposed regulatory changes will improve the department's ability to administer and enforce DBRA labor standards more effectively and efficiently. Proposed changes include:

Creating several efficiencies in the prevailing wage update system and ensuring prevailing wage rates keep up with actual wages, which over time would mean higher wages for workers.

Returning to the definition of "prevailing wage" used from 1935 to 1983 to ensure prevailing wages reflect actual wages paid to workers in the local community.

Periodically updating prevailing wage rates to address out-of-date wage determinations.

Providing broader authority to adopt state or local wage determinations when certain criteria are met.

Issuing supplemental rates for key job classifications when no survey data exists.

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Strengthening worker protections and enforcement, including debarment and anti-retaliation.

The DBRA's stated purpose is to ensure employers on federally funded or assisted construction projects pay locally prevailing wages to construction workers and to prevent the unintended consequence of depressing workers' wages during the government's extensive construction contracting activity.

"Given recent unprecedented investments in our nation's infrastructure, this comprehensive regulatory review is necessary to ensure employers on federally funded or assisted construction projects pay fair wages to the workers who build our roads, bridges, federal buildings and energy infrastructure," said Acting Wage and Hour Division Administrator Jessica Looman, in a statement. "The Davis-Bacon and Related Acts benefit construction workers, their families, their communities and taxpayers by ensuring all contractors can compete on equal footing and by preventing employers who pay workers substandard wages from gaining an unfair competitive advantage."



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Tree work safety for workers and employers

What is Tree Work?

Tree work operations include trimming, pruning, felling, and removal of trees and bushes.

Tree work activities can involve:

- Climbing trees
- Using portable ladders and aerial devices
- Working at heights while using power tools
- Working near energized overhead ordowned power lines
- Operating wood chippers

Tree Work Hazards

Tree work hazards can result in serious injury or death. Proper training and techniques can help avoid these common hazards:

- Falls
- Struck by tree branch or falling objects
- Palm tree skirt collapse and suffocation

- Chainsaw laceration
- · Wood chipper accident
- Ladder accident
- Flectric shock
- Harmful plant, insect, or animal exposure
- Heat illness

Heat Illness Prevention

Employers with outdoor workers must have a heat illness prevention plan and workers must be trained on how to prevent heat illness.

Cal/OSHA's regulation requires water, rest, and shade be provided at outdoor work sites.

Improve Tree Work Safety **Employers:**

Develop and maintain a workplace safety and health plan written in a language all workers understand.

- The plan should identify hazards for all tasks performed and equipment used, and provide safe work procedures to avoid those hazards.
- For tree work, it is important to conduct a daily job site inspection and hazard assessment at the start of each workday.

Provide safety training to workers

- Training should address how to safely perform tree work and avoid hazards.
- Include instruction on fall prevention, communication methods, first aid, emergency response and rescue procedures.

Ensure proper use and maintenance of tools and personal protective equipment (PPE)

- Inspect all tools, PPE, and safety equipment before each use.
- Safety equipment includes harnesses, belts, tree saddles, ropes, and lanyards.
- PPE includes hard hats, face shields, safety glasses and shoes, gloves, high visibility clothing, and hearing protection.
- Tools and equipment can include chainsaws, chippers, trimmers, and pole pruners.

Be a Qualified Tree Worker Workers:

Avoid hazards by taking steps to be a qualified tree worker

 Actively participate in the safety, health, and tree work training provided by your employer.

- Demonstrate familiarly with the hazards associated with tree work and how to avoid those hazards.
 - Properly use tree work tools and safety equipment.
- Help create and participate in a culture of safety at your tree work company by adhering to safe work practices.
- Notify your employer of workplace hazards, or contact Cal/ OSHA.



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Bidding wars break out in NY while San Fran multifamily properties struggle

The major coastal metros are following different paths to recovery.

New York City and San Francisco were the poster children for pandemic urban flight in 2020. As residents moved out of the two pricey coastal markets, landlords grappled with ballooning vacancies and rent decreases.

New York saw one-bedroom rents fall 17.6% from March 2020 to January 2021, according to apartment listing service Zumper. In San Francisco, rents in one-bedroom apartments fell 22.6% from November 2019 to November 2020.

Now, two years later, San Francisco and New York are rebounding, but they're not recovering at the same rates. In New York, rents have jumped and occupancies have tightened so much that there are now bidding wars for rentals in the city. In San Francisco, rents have risen but are still below pre-pandemic levels.


Big Apple bounceback

In New York, bidders are jockeying to get into empty apartments as rents rose 26% for one-bedrooms and 29.4% for two-bedrooms from February 2021 to February 2022, according to Zumper.

"The rental market in New York City is absolutely whitehot," said Michael P. Feldman, co-founder and CEO of New York-based property management firm Choice New York Cos. "It's just incredible."

On Chicago-based REIT Equity Residential's February earnings call, chief operating officer Michael Manelis said he expects the New York market's turnaround to continue.

"We expect New York to be our best-performing market in 2022 with same-store revenue growth of approximately 13% despite some expected pressure from new supply on the Jersey waterfront and Brooklyn," Manelis said.

Feldman says the New York recovery has been underway for a while as younger adults moved back into the city seeking to socialize, trailing the peaks and valleys of COVID-19 by a month or two. Then, as cases dipped, people felt more confident to lease apartments.

"COVID cases dip and, within a month, you see the increase," Feldman said. "It's a direct correlation. People feel like it's getting better."

Bay Area blues

While San Francisco has seen rent growth increase over the past year, it hasn't been enough to offset the dramatic losses in 2020. "The sites that are really struggling the most there are in the urban core," said Vanessa Siebern, senior vice president at Folsom, California-based FPI Management, the fourth largest property manager in the country. "That is where we're seeing slower recovery.

In those urban core markets, we're definitely not at prepandemic rents."

Rents for one-bedroom apartments have risen 10.6% in the city, while prices for two bedrooms have jumped 13.4% from February 2021 to February 2022, according to Zumper. While that is notable, they haven't passed prepandemic marks.

In EQR's portfolio, downtown apartments in San Francisco are 96% occupied, but the company does not yet see a lot of pricing power. It expects same-store revenue growth of around 7% in 2022, but it is still the only market in its portfolio where rents haven't passed pre-pandemic levels.

"You have signs of that demand returning in there," Manelis said on the earnings call. "You just don't have quite enough of it to get you that pricing power that you need to fully recapture everything."

While urban and tech areas suffered, other markets like Sacramento have flourished over the last couple of years. In many cases, these areas thrived because of the influx of people leaving the Bay Area.

"People didn't have to live in the urban core and report to an office," Siebern said. "So they were moving to areas that offered lower rent and a better quality of life."



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
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Say it again: Protecting construction workers from hearing loss

Half of construction workers have been exposed to hazardous noise but a wide range of protection devices allows a properly trained worker to select the the PPE that best blocks the noise created around them for health, safety and productivity

Common Construction Noise Hazards

On construction worksites, workers in 3 out of 10 companies are at risk of hearing loss – but many who could otherwise prevent hearing loss believe they've just "gotten used to the noise." The truth is that construction workers experience the second highest rate of occupational exposure to noise hazards – increasing the risk of noise-induced hearing loss.

No matter what precautions are taken, construction sites host numerous noise hazards. Often it is unclear what level of hearing protection is needed since the jobs conducted and tools used vary within a shift or project, along with the noise hazards. It's important for managers to efficiently monitor and mandate hearing protection for on-site construction workers by following a few crucial steps in training and preparation.

Exposure Rates and Effects

Construction noise hazards are everywhere when working on-site, but taking the proper precautions can mitigate risk, prevent injuries and save lives. Fortunately, there are many ways to protect worker hearing, including a variety of

Duration of exposure and proximity to the source are key factors that impact the effect of noise on hearin

While a wide variety of hearing protection options is beneficial, it can make the quest for the best fitting hearing protection devices (HPD) more difficult. So, what are the best practices for construction managers to effectively implement on-site hearing protection?

Train workers to assess noise risk . . .

Construction sites present several forms of noise hazards with varying levels of risk. When looking to determine the best hearing protection for a dangerous environment, managers must first identify the equipment that is causing noise exposure to understand the levels of risk associated with each piece of equipment. Whenever possible, immediately eliminate or reduce extreme noise levels, or offer workers suitable HPD.

For reference, any noise above 85 decibels (dB) has potential to cause long-term hearing loss. Some examples of

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common noise hazards on-site are when using a bulldozer (100 dB) and a chain saw (110 dB). Impact-noise exposures are enough to be harmful too. Repeated short spurts of noise, such as hammering in a nail (120 dB), can cause hearing damage.

If a worker's HPD does not fit properly, it cannot properly provide protection. An eighth of an inch can be the difference between receiving the stated level of protection based on the noise reduction rating on an earplug and getting no protection at all. Comfort and fit go hand in hand when talking about safety equipment. Ear-plug fit testing systems provide real-world metrics to help managers understand if employees are receiving optimal protection for the noise environments in which they work.

Another aspect to consider when choosing the right HPD for construction workers is its compatibility with the

variety of other protective equipment that keeps them safe – safety headwear, eyewear, clothing, shoes, gloves. Thus, selecting personal protective equipment (PPE) that does not compromise the operation or efficiency of another PPE is quite important. For instance, safety eyewear with thick frames (6mm) can cause a gap between the wearer's head and earmuffs, providing an easy way for sound to penetrate the earcup, and reduce optimal attenuation by 2 decibels. In this situation, ear plugs would be the best-fit HPD based on all the PPE required to do the job.

It is worth noting that any HPD that blocks sound 100% is also considered unsafe and not compatible for construction site use because it can increase other risks. While hearing protection is crucial, a worker who cannot hear the warning signal of a truck or piece of heavy equipment coming their way may be in more danger. Workers who cannot hear (and therefor, cannot communicate effectively with peers) are also more likely to make mistakes and tend to feel more isolated on the job.

Prepare for future HPD

While the options of HPD seem to be endless, the US industrial hearing protection market is expected to surpass \$650 million by 2024, according to a report by Global Market Insights. This boom in hearing protection technology will not only offer more devices to protect workers from hearing loss, but also add innovative technologies to advance the purpose and benefit of hearing protection.

For example, employers can integrate technology that allows for remote noise monitoring, performing annual audiometric screenings and hazard training on the irreversible impact of noise-induced hearing loss. For workers in noisy environments, new sound technologies embedded in connected earmuffs monitor sound exposure continuously and adjust in-ear volume to safer levels so the worker can communicate clearly.

The main use case for hearing protection will always be safety, but other features can help cultivate a better overall work environment. For example, studies show that ear protection with technologies such as integrated stereo sound can make workers more productive and motivated on the job.


Product innovations that utilize these modern technologies allow workers to be more responsive in the event of a safety issue and empower them to proactively mitigate or prevent future safety hazards. In doing so, workers are given more control over their safety in the workplace, both for immediate and long-term health.

Maintain construction workers health and productivity

While hazardous noise may not cause adverse effects at the time of exposure, the cumulative effects of ongoing exposure to hazardous noise can gravely impact long-term hearing. Construction workers whose jobs regularly involve loud machinery and tools to get the job done are particularly in need of hearing protection as a crucial element in ongoing occupational safety programs.

For leaders in the construction field, assessing the noise risk on jobsites and training workers to understand the importance of properly-fitting, comfortable and jobcompatible hearing protection is more than just a "*nice-to-have*," it is an investment in the health, longevity and productivity of workers.





Are your employees expecting a raise?

Wages are increasing. So is inflation. To stay competitive in a dynamic labor market, it's essential to understand what's going on in your industry, location, and with your competitors. Find and keep great people by making sure you review updated market data and establish pay practices for success!

Inflation & Wages

Consumer prices rose 7% year over year in December 2021, with the BLS reporting the largest 12-month increase in nearly 40 years! Wage increases minus inflation have driven "real wages" down by approximately 2% so don't be surprised if your employees tell you they are losing financial ground, especially if they haven't received a raise in the past six months.

Wages for many roles have increased significantly over the past year, with many sources reporting an average of a 5% increase. Yesterday I heard on the radio that several Ace Hardware stores are hiring new employees with a starting wage of \$18.50 per hour. Goodwill stores have banners up advertising a starting salary of \$16.50 per hour and Amazon continues to advertise their starting wage of \$20.00 per hour with a \$1,000 sign-on bonus. All of this information feeds into "The Great Resignation" and has many organizations taking a second look at their 2022 budgets and salary allocations. Employees are using this hot market to change jobs and potentially gain a much larger increase by switching employers, rather than staying for the standard 3% offered by their employer at annual raise time.

Revising Budgets

Employers have been continually adjusting their salary budgets for 2022 as these pay pressures continue. Initial estimates for 2022 salary budgets were close to 3%, but have since increased to 4%. According to some sources,


the increase amount is much closer to 5% for many organizations.



Capitol Connection Q&A for Contractors

When you qualify for another license is your 'number' up? Caveat Emptor, or 'buyer beware' is good advice regardless of what you are laying down dollars to own, including a contracting firm! Finally, a 'multiple choice' answer...

Q: We are considering purchasing a Contracting business in California. The Responsible Managing Officer (RMO) on the license would remain on the license but he is moving to Arizona. He would still be Managing projects for us in CA. He holds a license in Arizona and runs a separate company there and we are wondering if him Qualifying a license in another State will impact the CA License.

A: Good news! It will not impact the CA license. Besides answering a question regarding whether an applicant has ever had a license suspended/revoked/etc., the CSLB doesn't

concern themselves with applicant's licenses in other states.


Q: We recently formed an LLC with three equal Owners and we are in the final stretch with the CSLB issuing a CA Contractor's license. Initially, the three of us will be the only "workers", so we are permitted to be Exempt from Worker's comp, correct?

A: That is correct. If each of you are listed as Members and the LLC only employs the three of you, the Exemption from Workers Comp would be acceptable. If/when you hire employees in the future, you will need to update the CSLB by submitting a Certificate of Worker's comp.

Q: I have been talking to a Company who is currently licensed with a "C-46" license. I have a "C-10" (Electrical) license and they are interested in using my qualification. If I agree to that, do they take my license number? If not, what happens to my license in the meantime? What about when I leave the Company?

A: No, they do not "take" your license number. If you own less than 20% of the Company you are adding your

qualification to, you will be required to Inactivate your own license. It would just remain on Inactive status and you would be able to pay a fee and have it reactivated when you are ready in the future.

Q: You helped us obtain our license in California for the "A" (General Engineering) and the "B" (General Building) classifications. I remember there was some requirement that we submit one application at a time, so it ended up taking several months for us to complete both the "A" application process and then add the "B" classification to the license. We are now ready to start with the NV licensing process. Is it the same process where we need to do one at a time?

A: No, each state has different rules and interpretations so, unlike CA, you can apply for multiple classifications at the same time in Nevada.

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Digital detoxes, mental health at work and reimagining home

This week, we're focusing on mental health and well-being and considering how COVID-19 has changed our way of life.

We tend to spend more of our efforts reflecting on the past and anticipating the future. While that can be helpful, it can also rob us of enjoying the present—and the work we may need to do in the present to make a better tomorrow.

With that in mind, we're taking a closer look at mental health and well-being. We can't underemphasize the impact that COVID-19 has had on our lives. Even as cases subside and masks come off, we will be dealing with the long-term effects the pandemic has had on pretty much every facet of our daily lives.

With that in mind, here are a few articles that have captured our attention.

Mental Health in the Workplace

We saw this story being shared on LinkedIn this week, and it has stuck with us—so we're sharing with all of you.

The piece shares the story of an employee who was already working through some major life changes and challenges. Then COVID-19 hit. Fortunately, he had a great relationship with his manager, who reached out to see how he was doing. To her credit, the manager is open with her own mental health needs and puts her therapy appointments on her Outlook calendar. These two are far from alone in their mental health struggles.

A study published in late 2021 in Harvard Business Review concluded: "Mental health challenges are now the norm among employees across all organizational levels." Those findings are supported by other research

We want to remind you, and encourage you, that it can get better with the right support, be it therapy, medications or otherwise. It takes time and hard work, but it is possible. And frankly, it's incredible when you can feel like your old self again. In fact, the new perspective and tools gained through that support can make you even stronger and better than before.

Put Your Phone Down, and Slowly Walk Away

Recently, we have fallen back into these habits as we follow the developments on the Russia-Ukraine war. There is no shortage of heartbreaking images and news that was heretofore unfathomable.

It is important to stay informed and get that news from credible sources, as disinformation and misinformation campaigns abound. It is also important to protect our mental health.

One way to help yourself is to curb technology usage or media consumption through a digital detox. Detoxes can mean different things for different people, but a good place to start is by taking a step back and examining your relationship with technology. How do you feel? Are you seeing any changes in mood, sleep, relationships or eating habits? Then, set goals for yourself and focus on what behaviors need to shift in order to achieve those goals. You may find, as researchers have also, that sleep, relationships and mood improve as a result of less technology.

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
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Digital detoxes, mental health at work and reimagining home




