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Safety Starts at the Top—and with Better Head Protection

It's time to reconsider what head protection you provide construction workers because safety has lasting repercussions for employers and employees alike.

Construction sites are dangerous places, and they will continue to be dangerous places until we do something to make them safer.

In 2020, the incidence rate for nonfatal falls, slips or trips was higher for construction laborers (52.5 cases per 10,000 full-time workers) compared to all workers (22.9 cases), according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS). It's no surprise; there are construction jobsite risks everywhere, from falling objects to infectious diseases to chemical hazards.

To protect themselves, industrial tradespeople have worn traditional hard hats, the safety norm for more than a century. Conventional hard hats are designed primarily to protect the head from falling objects. However, there are many other ways that workers can seriously injure their heads on a construction site, including falls, slips and trips. Construction workers, therefore, need more protection than a traditional hard hat can provide.

A Change of Hats

Falls represent the third deadliest risk to construction personnel. In 2020, There were 1,008 documented fatal falls throughout the construction industry in the United States, about 35% of all construction accidents, according to the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA). These data points are not surprising, considering that more than half of the construction industry works on scaffolds, dramatically increasing the risk of falls from heights and related traumatic brain injuries (TBIs).

In response, the industry is beginning to rethink head protection. In lieu of the antiquated (Type I) hard hat, more plant operators, construction safety officers and others are considering the new Type II safety helmet for its superior safety as part of the broader personal protective equipment (PPE) product mix.

These ANSI-certified Type II safety helmets provide 360-degree head protection. Type II safety helmets integrate better shock-absorbing technology and feature front, side and rear impact protection. They also have chin straps and other technologies to keep the helmet on the head while offering better protection in the event of an accident. Some models even feature a rotational technology that reduces force to the brain from oblique or angled strikes.

These helmets typically require a greater up-front investment compared to a traditional hard hat but, in return, workers enjoy a significantly safer and usually more comfortable experience. That's because type II safety helmets are designed to improve wearability. Most importantly, they are considerably more effective at protecting tradespeople from severe injury or even death.


Here are some additional safety features that Type II helmets can offer:

Impact Protection — Impact protection technology, such as welded-tube polymers developed by Koroyd, crumples instantly on impact to absorb maximum force, protecting the skull and brain from both direct and angled impacts in the process. Angled impacts are more likely to cause rotational shifts of the brain in the skull, which can lead to more severe injury. Therefore, reducing the impact of angled and oblique impacts, in particular, can help reduce the risk of a life-changing or life-threatening injury.

Identification Technology — If a workplace incident does occur, some helmets include an integrated chip based on near-field communication (NFC) technology that stores emergency contacts and critical medical information for first responders to access. twICEme, for example, is a technology that utilizes NFC to enable first responders to scan the data from the top of the helmet to an app on their mobile device.

With traditional hardhats, workers often will include vital health information on a piece of paper affixed inside the hardhat. For certain head and neck injuries, this method can be problematic, as medical personnel may not want to remove the helmet initially to avoid further injury. This identification technology ensures critical data can be communicated quickly, even when the helmet cannot safely be removed.

Modular Rear Brims — Helmets may feature a slight rear brim designed for rain deflection or the traditional brim form factor to help protect against outdoor conditions. Depending on the jobsite and conditions, some Type II helmets enable the wearer to remove and replace brim components to further improve comfort and utility.

Four-Point Chin Strap Systems — Buckle enclosures with an adjustable nylon four-point chin strap are commonly found in action sports helmets, such as biking and rock climbing. When added to an industrial safety helmet, they offer construction workers maximum adjustability and easy one-handed use with gloves. The chin straps also keep the helmet in place versus the traditional strapless hardhat.

A Safer Workplace

Falls, trips and slips represent some of the leading causes of serious injury and death for construction workers, but they are preventable. Organizations can better protect their workers by following OSHA's recommendations, including its recent "Fall Protection Campaign." Furthermore, employers can better protect the workforce through investments in safer PPE, including Type II safety helmets.

According to the BLS, most of these head injuries resulting from a slip, trip or fall happen from heights of 6 feet or less. This is one of the main reasons why many commercial general contractors are mandating Type II safety helmets with chin straps, along with other certifications and requirements, to help ensure compliance with many high-profile jobsites.

Here are some of the other ways Type II helmets can keep workers safe on the job:

- Type II safety helmets offer physical and material advantages compared to traditional hard hats. They offer other safety benefits, including lower PPE turnover. Type II safety helmet lifetimes also typically last longer thanks to more thoughtful, ruggedized designs.
- Type II helmets can result in an overall lower risk of workplace injury thanks to front, side and rear impact safety and chin straps that help protect the head during falls; traditional Type I hard hats are only designed to protect the top of the head from falling objects.
- Fewer injuries equate to fewer worker compensation claims.
- A reduction in injuries can also help lower liability insurance costs.
- Overall risk reduction for the workplace.
- Stronger safety culture and an environment of caring.
- Increased productivity and potentially more earnings for workers, who can spend more time on the jobsite and less time recovering from injuries.

Although construction is physical work, the most essential asset for anyone working on a jobsite remains their brain—the most complex and important tool of all. Organizations, and workers themselves, are realizing the need to protect this most precious asset as much as possible for the sake of the build and everyone's livelihood and well-being.

Regulatory Update: Mixed Reaction to EPA New Carbon Pollution Standards for Fossil Fuel-Fired Power Plants

The announcement a few days ago by the EPA of proposed new carbon pollution standards for coal and natural gas-fired power plants has drawn mixed reactions.

The National Association of Manufacturers released a statement saying the standard was a grave risk to both the U.S. economy and families. Here is the statement from the organization's Vice President of Energy and Resources Policy Brandon Farris.

"Manufacturing in America is cleaner and more sustainable than ever, and the power generation sector has been making historic strides in bringing zero-emissions sources online. Even as that trend continues, this proposed regulation will prove unfeasible. With nearly 60% of our nation's energy generated from natural gas and coal, this will either require deployment of still nascent technologies at an impractical pace or force those plants to shut down entirely. With the many threats to global energy security, that is a grave risk to our economy and to our families. The U.S. cannot afford to shut down more than half of our power generation and grind our economy to a halt. The NAM looks forward to working with the administration to ensure emissions standards protect public health while allowing manufacturers to continue pioneering technologies to make our air even cleaner and our climate even healthier."

Another group, the National Resource Defense Council is in favor of the standard but wants to see more. They released the following statement:

While this proposal is a vitally important first step, the EPA can do more, and faster. One clear opportunity for securing greater emissions reductions is setting limits for more existing gas plants by lowering the unit size and capacity factor thresholds. And the EPA can—and should—adjust the timelines for compliance across all three categories to require emissions reductions sooner.

The climate crisis is urgent—every ton of carbon pollution we reduce in the near term will help reduce the impacts we face and the suffering we must endure. The power industry has the tools it needs to cut its outsized contribution to our country's carbon footprint. This proposal, with a few improvements, will ensure fossil power plants reduce their emissions commensurate with the best tools available.

The National Rural Electric Cooperative Association had this to say about the proposal, in an article in The New York Times. "This proposal will further strain America's electric grid and undermine decades of work to reliably keep the lights on across the nation," said Jim Matheson, president of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association, which operates power plants serving the nation's least developed communities.

But the White House insists that the standard “will protect public health, reduce harmful pollutants and deliver up to \$85 billion in climate and public health benefits over the next two decades.”

The administration says the proposal for coal and new natural gas power plants would avoid up to 617 million metric tons of total carbon dioxide (CO₂) through 2042, which is equivalent to reducing the annual emissions of 137 million passenger vehicles, roughly half the cars in the United States.

The White House predicts that in 2030 alone, the proposed standards would prevent:

- approximately 1,300 premature deaths;
- more than 800 hospital and emergency room visits;
- more than 300,000 cases of asthma attacks;
 - 38,000 school absence days;
 - 66,000 lost workdays.

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Why Training is Still one of the Best Ways to Prevent Falls

Over the past decade, businesses and regulators have focused more on preventing fatal workplace falls. Unfortunately, falls continue to occur at an alarming rate. Falls are one of the leading causes of workplace death in the United States, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Although fall prevention has been a big topic of conversation within construction for many years, no industry is safe from fall hazards. In 2020, 368 construction workers died from falls, while 805 workers across all sectors lost their lives to falls.

Despite the high incident rate and increased awareness, many companies continue to struggle with fall prevention. In fact, fall protection has been the most cited OSHA violation for the past decade.

One of the most prominent hurdles organizations face when addressing fall hazards is how complex the subject can be. All the standards, regulations, equipment options and required training make managing the issue properly a real challenge for even the most safety-conscious companies.

Also, while fatal falls happen regularly across the country, most companies have never experienced one. This relative rarity means many businesses are inexperienced and unprepared for falls and are then left picking up the pieces, and the bill, when a fall occurs.

A deeper understanding of the root causes of these accidents is greatly needed to strengthen standards and save lives.

A recent survey uncovered interesting findings into the underlying causes of workplace falls from height. The anonymous 32-question Fall Experience Survey, conducted by The Center for Construction Research and Training with support from the American Society of Safety Professionals, gathered information from 671 safety professionals and others about workplace falls they had been involved in, witnessed or investigated.

Key Findings from the Survey

- Insufficient or ineffective planning was the most selected primary cause for falls (27%).
- The likelihood of using fall protection was 71% lower for individuals whose employer or competent person did not do any planning.

- Nearly half (49%) of respondents said that no fall protection was being used at the time of the fall.
- Respondents who believed fall protection was required by their employer were eight times more likely to use it.
- The odds of a fall being fatal were 76% lower for those who had self-rescue training compared to those who did not have this training.
- Subcontractor employees were 2.7 times more likely to die from the fall than those who worked for a general contractor.

Companies have a moral and legal obligation to protect their workers from recognized hazards in their workplace. Those who want to avoid the pain and suffering—not to mention the steep price tag of severe or fatal workplace falls—must reevaluate their approach and refocus their attention on the subject. Unfortunately, the survey shows that many organizations are not doing enough to address fall hazards, and their employees are paying the price.

In addition, this survey also illuminates something safety professionals figured out a long time ago: If your company doesn't adequately train its employees to use fall protection, you're not doing enough to protect your workers from severe or fatal falls.

Investing in Fall Protection

The continuous push by companies to boost profits by increasing efficiency and cutting costs has negative consequences for workplace safety. This idea of doing more with less means leaders may try to make a job work with the tools and supplies they currently have instead of investing in the best tools.

Unfortunately, this is a recipe for disaster when it comes to fall protection. That's because there is no one-size-fits-all solution when addressing fall hazards. Fall threats are unique. Each situation may require a different answer, and using the wrong piece of fall protection equipment may not provide the protection the user intended.

Some organizations buy the latest gear and install anchor points and other fall protection systems throughout their facilities and think that is enough to become OSHA-compliant and eliminate workplace falls. While this is an excellent first step, it misses one of the most crucial steps to protecting your workers from falls: training.

What's the point of investing all that money into fall protection if nobody knows how to use it properly? Fall protection is a complicated subject. Without proper training, the best equipment in the world can't protect your workers from falls. The consequences are too extreme to leave fall protection up to chance; that's why the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) makes training mandatory.

According to OSHA 1910.30, employers must provide fall protection training from a qualified person before employees can perform work that may expose them to a fall. That training must educate on recognizing fall hazards; minimizing their risks; and identifying the correct way to install, inspect, operate and disassemble the personal fall protection employees will use.

In addition, employers must retrain workers periodically and whenever there are any changes to fall protection systems and equipment.

When choosing fall protection, one mistake in judgment is enough to land an employee in the hospital—or worse. Fall protection also tends to give users a false sense of security. This is especially true for users who do not fully understand the nuances of fall protection and its application. Let's look at a couple common scenarios where an incomplete understanding of the applications of fall protection components can result in severe consequences.

Scenario 1: A construction worker is near the unprotected third-floor edge of an exposed concrete slab. They are wearing a harness with a nylon self-retracting lanyard connected to an anchor point on the roof above. The worker assumes they are safe because they're tied off. However, they slip over the edge and the nylon lanyard is cut when it contacts the sharp edge of the concrete slab. If the worker and their supervisor were adequately trained, they would know they were performing leading-edge work. Leading-edge work requires fall protection designed for the application, often a reinforced steel cable lanyard that can withstand the cutting force of the leading edge.

Scenario 2: An employee is inside the basket of a boom lift and is tied off to the designated anchor point with a harness and a 6-foot nylon lanyard. The lift hits a bump while driving, and the employee is thrown from the basket and left

hanging over the side of the lift. They now require someone to rescue them and are in a potentially fatal situation because hanging in a harness for as little as 10 minutes can be fatal. If the worker and their supervisor were adequately trained, they would know that a self-retracting lanyard is a better fit for this scenario and would likely have prevented the employee from leaving the basket.

Scenarios like these illustrate why proper employee fall protection training is so vital. However, training doesn't end with picking the appropriate protection for the job or identifying hazards; it also includes maintaining your equipment. Fall protection must be continuously maintained to ensure that it works as intended and protects your workers when they need it most. OSHA requires that employers perform regular equipment inspections on all fall protection components to ensure it is safe and compliant. In addition, users must inspect their fall protection before every use.

Conducting these inspections is essential to maintain the quality and safety of your equipment—and the health and well-being of your employees.

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If You Feel You Are Being Watched, You Are

New survey shows 96% of companies are using employee monitoring software.

Ever since COVID many companies have developed ways to keep an eye on employees. What are the results of this surveillance? In March, ResumeBuilder.com surveyed 1,000 business leaders at companies with a primarily remote and/or hybrid workforce and found the following: *96% of Remote Companies Use Employee Monitoring Software*

“It’s clear from our survey that there are still organizations struggling to manage their workforce post-pandemic,” comments Chief Career Advisor Staci Haller, in a statement. “The focus on hours worked versus actual productivity and the successful completion of timely projects seems to reflect the challenges management teams are facing when it comes to readjusting how they manage a remote workforce.”

This confusion is causing employers to turn to monitoring. And employees know about this; only 5% say their employees are unaware they are being monitored.

Just 10% of remote companies were monitoring employees pre-pandemic, while 37% started during the first year of the pandemic and 20% started monitoring within the past year.

Results? Companies love it -- 96% say it’s paying off. Ninety-seven percent of respondents ‘somewhat’ (34%) or ‘strongly’ (63%) believe that implementing this software has increased employee productivity

When asked to list the ways in which their company uses monitoring software, the most common answers were monitoring web browsing and application use (62%) and blocking content and applications (49%).

And some companies, 37% according to the survey, require remote employees to be on camera all day. Of this group, 93% say the live video feed is monitored, with the majority reporting that the person or people watching the feeds do so for 4 or more hours per day.

7 in 10 Say Employees Have Quit Over Monitoring

The other side of the increase in productivity is that companies are losing employees. In fact, 69% of companies say they’ve had employees quit because they didn’t want to be monitored. Of this group, the largest percentage (35%) say the company has lost 6-10 workers over this issue.

“In our study, it was found that folks had, on average, about 2 hours of non-productive time during the day, but I would point out that 2 hours may be easily wasted when working in-house as well,” continues Haller, in a statement. “However, in-house employees are not being monitored in the same way. It is not surprising that many employees do not want to feel like big brother is watching them daily when they are good employees and working hard for their organization.”

In addition to quitting, 73% of companies said they have let workers go based on data from this surveillance. Of this group, 34% say six to ten workers have been fired as after reviewing this data.

1 in 10 Say Monitoring Software is Used to Encourage RTO

Fourteen percent of respondents say their in-person employees are not subject to monitoring software, while 85% say their in-person workers are also subject to monitoring.

Of this 14%, more than two-thirds (about 1 in 10 of the total sample) believe that the fact that only remote workers have to be monitored is used to encourage employees to work in person more often.

When asked why they believe this, write-in responses included:

- “Pursue higher work efficiency and team spirit”
- “We can push each other to work”
- “Telecommuting can make it difficult to communicate and collaborate with employees”



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How 1 employer tried a 4-day workweek for deskless workers — and why it didn't stick

While the concept of the four-day workweek may be a new business trend, such arrangements may not be possible for everyone, especially deskless workers.

O.C. Tanner, an employee recognition company, attempted a four-day workweek with their 450 factory workers, seeing if they could offer them the same kind of flexibility being enjoyed by the company's office staff.

While it didn't quite work out, Gary Peterson, executive vice president of supply chain and production at O.C. Tanner, said the company learned a lot about their business in the process, and showed their workers that they listened and cared about them.

Their experience can also show how other companies might try different kinds of work schedules too, for all their employees.


Giving the four-day workweek a try

O.C. Tanner had attempted a four-day workweek with production team workers about decade ago, Peterson said, and it didn't work. Still, given that the company's desked workers had more flexibility in work arrangements, O.C. Tanner didn't want deskless workers to feel left out or ignored when they asked if it would be possible for them too.

"If I had just said to all the people who were asking, 'Look, we investigated it 10 years ago, it doesn't work, let it go,' that just doesn't fly," said Peterson. So they investigated it again.

First, management looked at the current schedules for their 450 factory workers. They had a day shift, which worked eight-hour shifts, Monday to Friday, and a night shift, which worked nine-hour shifts Monday to Thursday and a four hour shift on Friday. "We like to get our second shift home on Friday nights at 6pm," he said.

Their best chance at a four-day workweek, Petersen thought, was moving to four 10-hour shifts per week — with some employees working Monday to Thursday and others Tuesday to Friday.

They ran into a few problems. First, no one wanted the Tuesday to Friday shift, but O.C. Tanner needed Fridays covered because they ship product five days a week. Second, the day and night shift typically overlapped by 10 minutes. “There’s not enough equipment that I could run a shift another two hours,” he said. Asking workers on the night shift to stay an hour later wasn’t well received either. Trying to shift to a four-day workweek also affected overtime options, and meant people would be coming in on a fifth day anyway.

There were also safety concerns with having workers stretch to 10-hour workdays. “It’s a physical job. We’re on our feet, we’re working, we’re handling products, and it takes a physical toll,” he said. The company already knew that on the ninth hour of night shift work, “we really have to be mindful of safety and ergonomics,” he said. “Going another hour beyond that, I’d be worried about everybody’s safety.”

After two months of trying, they went back to their previous system.

The value of trying something new

But Peterson doesn’t think it was a waste of effort. Workers appreciated that management listened to their request, and put hours into trying to map out alternative work schedules. When they saw it wasn’t working, for both the sake of the company or their own safety, they knew at least their bosses had listened, and tried.

That sends a clear message about company culture, said Jessica Kriegel, chief scientist of workplace culture at Culture Partners, and that a company is willing listen to employee concerns and try something different. “Innovation is failing fast. If you don’t fail fast, you’re never innovating, and obviously they’ve done something innovative,” she said.

While not the right situation for a business like O.C. Tanner, companies can also try other kinds of work arrangements for employees who need to be on-site, without needing to reinvent the wheel. “The four-day workweek is one model. It’s arbitrary,” she said. Nurses, firefighters and flight attendants already work schedules where they’re on and off a specific number of days, and could be used for other kinds of essential or in-person jobs, where appropriate.

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Capitol Connection Q&A for Contractors

Can what's old really be 'new' again? I give a contractor a very positive spin and sort a competitive question about multiple names before charging into the answer on battery storage systems licensing...

Q: If I was a Responsible Managing Employee (RME) in 2016 but am no longer associated with a license, can I initiate a license under a new company with my old test results?

A: If you have not been associated with a license for over five years, you will be required to re-test to become the Qualifier on a license again.

Q: I always get helpful information from your posts. I currently have a Sole Proprietorship "B" (General Building) license. Would I be allowed to RMO an additional two licenses as long as I have 20% ownership in each corporation? It is very important to me that I be able to maintain my own license for projects on the side.

A: Yes! Actually, as long as you have 20% ownership in each company, you can actually qualify up to three licenses aside from your personal license.

Q: We are discussing internally whether there is any benefit to operating our company under two business names, however we are unsure if we are able to do this as a contractor licensed entity. For example, I am aware that in CA licensed contractors are not permitted to conduct business under more than one name for each license (Cal.Bus. & Prof.Code § 7059.1), however I know there are other companies, including our competitor, who operate with two different names. Do you have any insight on if and how licenses entities can operate with multiple business names in CA, AZ and NV? Take CA for example, does the section referenced above simply prohibit a company from operating under two names entirely, or does it mean that we would need to obtain separate licenses for each name?

A: Companies operating with more than one business name either have multiple businesses set up with separate contractor's license numbers, OR they are operating under different dba names under the same entity, with each dba needing it's own contractor's license.

Q: What type of license is required for battery energy storage systems? I'm an out of State contractor and I'm getting answers that are all over the map.

A: That's because the answer is somewhat all over the map. A licensed contractor with an "A", "B", "C-10", or "C-46" classification can perform work involving battery energy storage systems.

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
