Last week, the Occupational Safety & Health Administration issued the Emergency Temporary Standard (ETS) that implements the Biden Administration's COVID-19 vaccine mandate for large employers.

'Large employers' are defined as employers with 100 or more employees.

The OSHA ETS will be published in the Federal Register and it became effective on November 5th, 2021 with employers' obligations set to begin on Dec. 5th.

What's new for 2022? A sneak peek at 6 new laws

Some good news for California employers: there are far less employment-related bills than in years past. This is in large part because legislators were limited in the number of bills they could pass this year due to COVID-19 limitations. Also, this year's stack of bills is arguably lighter due to attention placed on the Governor's recall.

However, the bills that did make the cut certainly have some teeth, and will dramatically change how certain employers do business in California. This is not to mention the numerous COVID-related laws and regulations concerning illness prevention, testing, and vaccination requirements.

Each year, CEA details new employment laws at our annual Labor Law Update, and provides businesses with practical solutions and next steps to stay compliant.

CFRA - Covered Family Members

AB 1033 adds "parent-in-law" as a covered family member when an employee takes leave under the California Family Rights Act (CFRA). Remember, CFRA was amended last year to now cover employers with only 5 or more employees.

Be sure to work with an HR advisor to draft a compliant CFRA policy.

Wage Theft as Grand Theft

AB 1003 makes the intentional theft of wages, including gratuities, "grand theft" under the California Penal Code, when in a 12-month period the amount is greater than:

\$950 from any one employee/independent contractor; or \$2,350 in the aggregate from 2 or more employees/independent contractors.

As such, it is more important than ever for supervisors to understand how to properly pay employees, as well as handle tips, minimum wage and overtime obligations, etc. These issues can be particularly challenging for new supervisors. Cal/OSHA Authority

In response to the pandemic and safety issues in the workplace, SB 606 creates a rebuttable presumption that

a violation by an employer that has multiple worksites is enterprise-wide, when: (1) an employer has a written policy or procedure that violates the law; or (2) Cal/OSHA has evidence of a pattern or practice of the same violation involving more than one worksite.

An "enterprise-wide" violation is subject to willful or repeated conduct penalties. Be sure to work with counsel or a safety partner to review your Injury and Illness Prevention Plan, and COVID-19 Prevention Plan (which is required in writing, regardless of employer size)! Minimum Wage & Exempt Salary Increases

State minimum wage requirements for non-exempt employees will increase in 2022, as follows:

0-25 Employees: \$14.00/hour 26+ Employees: \$15.00/hour

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Of course, don't forget that there are many local minimum wages that exceed the minimum state amounts. Be sure to check local minimum wage requirements where you have workers, including remote employees working from home!

The minimum exempt employee salary amount is two times the state minimum wage. As such, increases in the state minimum wages for 2022 means that the exempt employee minimum salary amounts are also increased, as follows:

0-25 Employees: \$58,240/year 26+ Employees: \$62,400/year

Warehouse Distribution Centers

A watershed bill, AB 701 – targeted at businesses like Amazon – requires large warehouse distribution centers (i.e., 100 or more employees at a single warehouse distribution center or 1,000 or more employees at one

or more warehouse distribution centers in California) to provide each nonexempt employee upon hire: (1) a written description of each quota the employee is subject to; and (2) list any potential adverse action that may result from failure to meet the quota. An employee will not be required to meet any quota that prevents compliance with meal, rest, or bathroom breaks, or health and safety laws.

Garment Manufacturers

SB 62 eliminates piece rate pay as a legal method of payment for certain non-unionized workers in garment manufacturing. It comes with hefty consequences too – statutory damages of \$200 per employee/per pay period in which an employee is paid by piece rate.

DWC issues notice of December 17 public hearing for QME electronic service regulation

The Division of Workers Compensation (DWC) has issued a notice of public hearing on December 17 for the adoption of California Code of Regulations, title 8, section 36.7: Electronic Service of Medical-Legal Reports by Medical Evaluators.

The proposed adoption makes permanent the emergency regulation that was adopted in May 2020. The adoption of regulation section 36.7 provides a mechanism for electronic service of medical-legal reports and all documents required by section 36.

A public hearing will be held via Zoom on Friday, December 17, 2021 at 10 a.m. and members of the public can submit written comments until 11:59 p.m. that day.

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The Markets (as of market close October 29, 2021)

October proved to be one of the best months for equities in 2021, with each of the benchmark indexes listed here enjoying solid gains. The S&P 500 had its best month since November 2020. The Nasdaq picked up over 7.25%, the largest monthly advance in more than a year. Strong third-quarter corporate earnings data helped ease investor concerns that rising inflation, supply-chain bottlenecks, labor shortages, and rising coronavirus cases would hamper corporate America. Year to date, each of the indexes is well over 16.00% higher than its respective 2020 closing value, with the S&P 500 and the Nasdaq more than 20.00% higher.

Wall Street's strong October performance came despite a notable slowdown in economic growth as third-quarter GDP rose 2.0%, following a 6.7% increase in the second quarter. Job growth slowed, although the number of unemployment claims also decreased. Inflationary pressures appear to be more than transitory as the latest Consumer Price Index showed prices rose 0.4%, while producer prices increased 0.5%. The housing sector enjoyed solid gains as sales of both new and existing homes rose. Each of the market sectors advanced, with energy (16.9%) and consumer discretionary (9.3%) leading the way.

Ten-year Treasury yields inched higher in October, the dollar dipped lower, gold prices increased nearly 1.50%, and crude oil prices rose more than 10.00% to \$83.27 per barrel. The national average retail price for regular gasoline was \$3.383 per gallon on October 25, up from the September 27 price of \$3.175 per gallon.

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

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

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Latest Economic Reports

Employment: The pace of job gains continued to slow in September, as 194,000 new jobs were added, well off the pace set in August (366,000) and July (1,091,000). Through the first nine months of the year, monthly job growth has averaged 561,000. The unemployment rate declined by 0.4 percentage point to 4.8% in September. The number of unemployed persons fell by 710,000 to 7.7 million. Both measures are down considerably from their highs at the end of the February-April 2020 period. However, they remain above their levels prior to the COVID-19 pandemic (3.5% and 5.7 million, respectively, in February 2020). In September, notable job gains occurred in leisure and hospitality (74,000), professional and business services (60,000), retail trade (56,000), transportation and warehousing (47,000), and in information technology (32,000). Employment decreased by 144,000 in local government education and by 17,000 in state government education. Among the unemployed, the number of

permanent job losers declined by 236,000 to 2.3 million in September but is 953,000 higher than in February 2020. The number of persons not in the labor force who currently want a job was 6.0 million, down by roughly 300,000 from the August total. The labor force participation rate in September, at 61.6%, dipped 0.1 percentage point from the August rate and has remained within a narrow range of 61.4% to 61.7% since June 2020. The employmentpopulation ratio was 58.7% in September, up 0.2 percentage point from the previous month. This measure is up from its low of 51.3% in April 2020 but remains below the figure of 61.1% in February 2020. In September, 13.2% of employed persons teleworked because of the pandemic, little changed from the prior month. In September, 5.0 million persons reported that they had been unable to work because their employer closed or lost business due to the pandemic, which is down from 5.6 million in August. Average hourly earnings rose \$0.19 to \$30.85. Earnings have increased 4.6% since September 2020. The average work week in September was 34.8 hours, an increase of 0.2 hours from August.

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The number of claims for unemployment insurance fell in October. According to the latest weekly totals, as of October 16, there were 2,243,000 workers receiving unemployment insurance benefits, down from the September 18 total of 2,802,000. The unemployment rate for the week ended October 16 was 1.7%, down 0.3 percentage point from the September 18 rate of 2.0%. During the week ended October 9, Extended Benefits were available in four states/territories: Alaska, Connecticut, New Jersey, and New Mexico; 42 states reported 270,013 continued weekly claims for Pandemic Unemployment Assistance benefits (1,059,248 on September 11), and 45 states reported 244,379 continued claims for Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation benefits (991,813 on September 11).

FOMC/interest rates: The Federal Open Market Committee did not meet in October. The next scheduled meeting is November 2-3. Nevertheless, several members of the Committee, including Chair Jerome Powell, have

indicated that The Federal Reserve is likely to begin scaling back its asset purchasing program as early as November. Also, Powell acknowledged that inflationary pressures may continue to increase for a longer period than previously anticipated, which could prompt an increase in the federal funds rate.

GDP/budget: According to the first, or "advance" estimate from the Bureau of Economic Analysis, the economy accelerated at an annual rate of 2.0% in the third quarter after advancing 6.7% in the second quarter. Consumer spending, as measured by personal consumption expenditures, increased 1.6% in the third quarter after rising 12.0% in the prior quarter. The personal consumption price index (prices for consumer goods and services) rose 5.3% in the third quarter after climbing 6.5% in the second quarter. Excluding food and energy, the price index increased 4.5% in the third quarter compared with an increase of 6.1% in the second quarter. In the third quarter, fixed investment dipped 0.8% following a 3.3% increase in the second quarter, and residential fixed investment fell 7.7% after

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decreasing 11.7% in the second quarter. Exports slid 2.5% in the third quarter after increasing 7.6% in the second quarter. Imports (which are a negative in the calculation of GDP) increased 6.1% in the third quarter (7.1% in the second quarter).

The Treasury budget deficit for September came in at \$61.5 billion, 51.0% under the deficit in the same month last year. Following the latest increase, the budget deficit for fiscal year 2021, which ends in September, widened to \$2.77 trillion, 11.0% smaller than the deficit for fiscal year 2020. Compared to fiscal year 2020, government expenditures rose by 4.0% in fiscal year 2021, however that increase was offset by an 18.0% increase in government receipts. Individual income taxes rose 27.1% in fiscal year 2021, while corporate income taxes increased 76.0%.

Inflation/consumer spending: Prices at the consumer level continued to advance in September but at a slightly slower pace. According to the latest Personal Income and Outlays report, consumer prices rose 0.3% in September, the same increase as in August (revised). Prices have increased 4.4% since September 2020. Excluding food and energy, consumer prices rose 0.2% in September (0.3% in August) and 3.6% since September 2020. Personal income decreased 1.0% in September, while disposable (after-tax) personal income fell 1.3%. The decrease in personal income in September primarily reflected a decrease in government social benefits. Consumer spending rose 0.6% in September


following a 1.0% increase in August.

The Consumer Price Index climbed 0.4% in September following a 0.3% jump in August. Over the 12 months ended in September, the CPI rose 5.4%. Prices less food and energy rose 0.2% in September. Higher costs for food and fuel, as well as other items, such as new vehicles, have mainly contributed to the increase in the CPI. Food prices rose 0.9% in September, while energy prices increased 1.3% (fuel oil prices climbed 3.9%), and new vehicle prices advanced 1.3%. Shelter costs, which account for about one third of the CPI, gained 0.4% in September.

Producer prices continued to climb in September. Prices that producers receive for goods and services increased 0.5% for the month after rising 0.7% in August and 1.0% in July. Producer prices increased 8.6% for the 12 months ended in September, the largest yearly gain since November 2010 when 12-month data was first calculated. In September, prices for services rose 0.2% (0.7% in August), and prices for goods moved up 1.3% (1.0% in August). Producer prices less foods, energy, and trade services advanced 0.1% in September (0.3% in August) and have risen 5.9% since September 2020. Energy prices jumped 2.8% in September, while prices for food rose 2.0%.

Housing: Existing home sales rebounded from an August dip, advancing 7.0% in September. Nevertheless, over the past 12 months, existing home sales have dropped 2.3%. The median existing-home price was \$352,800 in September (\$356,700 in August), up 13.3% from September

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2020 (\$311,500). Total housing inventory at the end of September dropped 0.8% from August's supply and is down 13.0% from one year ago. In September, unsold inventory sat at a 2.4-month supply at the present sales pace (2.6 month supply in August). Sales of existing single-family homes also rose in September, climbing 7.7% after decreasing 1.9% in August. Year over year, sales of existing single-family homes fell 3.1%. The median existing single-family home price was \$359,700 in September, down from \$363,800 in August.

New single-family home sales increased in September, advancing 14.0% after falling 1.4% in August (revised). Despite the recent monthly increase, sales of new single-family homes have decreased 17.6% from September 2020. The median sales price of new single-family houses sold in September was \$408,800 (\$401,500 in August). The September average sales price was \$451,700 (\$446,900 in August). The inventory of new single-family homes for sale in September represents a supply of 5.7 months at the current sales pace, down from the August revised estimate of 6.5 months.

Manufacturing: Industrial production fell 1.3% in September following a 0.1% dip in August (revised). Manufacturing output decreased 0.7% after declining 0.4% in August, as production of motor vehicles and parts fell 7.2% due to shortages of semiconductors. Factory output elsewhere declined 0.3%. Utilities dropped 3.6%, while

mining production fell 2.3%. Much of the weakness in production in September resulted from large decreases in consumer goods and materials. Business equipment, defense and space equipment, and construction supplies recorded small gains, while business supplies recorded a small loss. Despite the recent downturns, total industrial production in September was 4.6% above its year-earlier level.

New orders for durable goods decreased \$1.0 billion, or 0.4%, in September after advancing 1.3% in August (revised). Transportation drove the September decline, falling \$1.8 billion, or 2.3%. Excluding transportation, new orders rose 0.4% in September. Shipments (0.4%), unfilled orders (0.7%), and inventories (0.9%) advanced in September. New orders for nondefense capital goods decreased 4.2%, as nondefense aircraft and parts fell 27.9%. New orders for defense aircraft and parts increased 104.3% in September.

Imports and exports: September import prices rose 0.4% following a 0.3% dip in August. Import prices rose 9.2% over the 12 months ended in September (8.9% for the 12 months ended in August). Import fuel prices fell 2.3% in August — the first monthly decrease since October 2020. The September monthly advance was largely driven by higher fuel prices, which rose 3.7%. Nonfuel import prices were flat on the month after falling 0.1% in August. Import fuel prices advanced 68.7% for the year ended in September.

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Export prices edged up 0.1% in September after increasing 0.4% in August. For the year ended in September, the price index for exports rose 16.3%. Export prices have not recorded a monthly decline since a 3.5% dip in April 2020.

The international trade in goods advance report showed the deficit deepened by \$8.1 billion, or 9.2%, to \$96.3 billion. In September, exports decreased \$7.0 billion, or 4.7%, while imports rose \$1.1 billion, or 0.5%. For the 12 months ended in September, exports have risen 16.8%, while imports have increased 18.0%.

The latest information on international trade in goods and services, out October 5, was for August and showed that the goods and services trade deficit increased by 4.2% to \$73.3 billion. August exports rose 0.5%, while imports advanced 1.4%. Year over year, the goods and services deficit increased \$140.8 billion, or 33.7%, from August 2020. Exports increased \$244.3 billion, or 17.5%. Imports increased \$385.1 billion, or 21.2%.


International markets: Despite rising inflation in the eurozone, the European Central Bank is likely to maintain interest rates in negative territory for at least another year, diverging from other central banks including the Federal

Reserve. Supply shortages, delivery bottlenecks, and labor constraints continue to drive producer prices and consumer prices higher. Consumer prices in October continued to climb in several countries including Italy (0.6%), France (0.4%), Germany (0.5%), and the United Kingdom (0.3%). China is still dealing with the economic impact of the pandemic. Unlike, the United States, which saw consumer spending rebound, China has seen consumer consumption stay subdued. In the market for October, the STOXX Europe 600 Index climbed 4.5%; the United Kingdom's FTSE increased 2.8%; Japan's Nikkei 225 Index rose 0.4%; and China's Shanghai Composite Index dipped 0.6%.

Consumer confidence: According to the latest report from The Conference Board, consumer confidence increased in October, following declines in the previous three months. The Consumer Confidence Index® stands at 113.8, up from 109.8 in September. The Present Situation Index, based on consumers' assessment of current business and labor market conditions, rose to 147.4 in October from 144.3 the previous month. The Expectations Index, based on consumers' short-term outlook for income, business,

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and labor market conditions, registered 91.3 in October, up from 86.7 in September. According to the report, consumer confidence improved in October, reversing a three-month downward trend as concerns about the spread of the Delta variant eased.

Eye on the Month Ahead

Job growth has slowed somewhat, while inflation has continued to rise. The Federal Reserve has hinted that it will begin scaling back asset purchases as early as November. With inflationary pressures mounting, it is possible that an upward adjustment to the federal funds rate may occur sooner rather than later. In addition, there may be follow-up items from the G-20 meeting held on October 30 in Rome. Items on the agenda included high energy prices, supply chain problems, and a global minimum tax rate. In addition, Congress is likely to continue working to reach a deal on a \$1.75 trillion economic and environmental bill in November.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average (DJIA) is a price-weighted index composed of 30 widely traded blue-chip U.S. common stocks. Capitol Connection Q&A for Contractors

When it comes to law, any kind, it's better to know, than not! A couple of contractors share lessons on business changes affecting their licensing. Don't fail to read it all as CSLB has important news to share for all, especially Solar contractors ...

Q: I have a "C-54" Tile license and we have a potential job which we have been offered but I am not completely confident we are permitted to handle this specific type of work. The project involves installing a brick veneer decorative layer on a wall for a new School being built. Is it appropriate for us to contract for this work, or does it require a "C-29" Masonry Contractor?

A: A "C-54" Contractor can install thin brick tiles which are installed using thin-set method. The CSLB's description of a "C-54" Tile Contractor includes the installation of "thin tile that resembles full brick...or any tile units set in the traditional or innovative tile methods ..."

Also, for public works contracts (such as schools), the awarding authority has the discretion to determine the license classification necessary to perform the project.

Q: We are interested in doing some work with another company who has been asked by one of their largest customers to perform several large projects out here in the West, but they are unlicensed. We are looking at both CA and NV. Are we able to form a Joint Venture and do business as such under our Company's license?

A: No. A Joint Venture for the purposes of performing Contracting work in CA and NV is made up of two licensed entities. In CA, two licensed entities are required to obtain a separate license for the Joint Venture.

For Nevada, if either of the licensed entities holds a "limited" license (monetary limit), a separate license is required. If each entity holds "unlimited" licenses, they are permitted to do work as a Joint Venture with written notification filed with the NSCB (Nevada State Contractors Board).

Q: We currently have a General Partnership license made up of two Corporations. One of the Corporations has

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converted to an LLC. Is there a form to use to update the CSLB license?

A: You will actually be required to apply for a new Contractor's license. You cannot make changes to the General Partner of a Partnership license. Next time call first, it could help make changes easier, and less costly.

CSLB UPDATES:

As those in the BESS industry are aware, on July 27th, after a long meeting of reviewing, discussing, and listening to comments from all ends of the spectrum, the CSLB ruled to preclude "C-46" Solar Contractors from installing BESS.

Effective October 1, 2021, the Contractors State License Board will not enforce or implement its July 27, 2021,

decision related to solar energy storage systems and industry bulletins numbered CSLB 21-14 and CSLB 21-15 until resolution of a pending lawsuit.

Therefore, for the time being, "C-46" Solar Contractors may still install BESS until further notice.

Falling in line with food, gas, and everything else, the CSLB fees are increasing again effective 1/1/2022. Get your applications in now to avoid the fee hike!

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

Can I email 2022 Employment Law Posters?

When new 2022 employment law postings come out in January, employers will be able to email some of the required postings to remote workers, specifically those required by the California Labor Code. Unfortunately, employers must still mail hardcopies of certain notices to workers who are 100% remote.

On July 16, 2021, SB 657 amended the California Labor Code to allow employers to distribute certain workplace notices and posters as an email attachment to remote workers, in addition to displaying the postings as required by law. The amendment becomes effective Jan. 1, 2022.

However, there are many required postings under the California Fair Employment and Housing Act (FEHA) and other statutes not addressed in this new law. While employers are able to email some of the required postings to remote workers, many others, such as federal postings and the EDD poster, to name just two, have still not been approved for electronic distribution.

What We Recommend

If you prefer the "all-in-one" State & Federal Employment Labor Law Poster (rather than printing each notice individually) we recommend that you mail hard copies of the one poster to any fully remote employees (meaning they never come to the worksite at any point during the year). If you have remote employees who even occasionally report to the worksite, then you have satisfied your obligations when you display your 2022 poster conspicuously at your company.



Order Now & Avoid Fines

Start preparing for next year. 2022 State & Federal Labor Law Posters are available for pre-order now. Posters will ship in mid-December as soon as each agency releases their 2022 posting.

The maximum penalty for federal posting violations is increasing per the Department of Labor as they highlight the seriousness of posting compliance. The new maximum fine amounts are:

Job Safety and Health: It's the Law (OSHA): \$13,653 Employee Polygraph Protection Act (EPPA): \$21,663 Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC): \$576 Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA): \$178

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

Each public agency that elects to become subject to the uniform construction accounting procedures set forth in Article 2 (commencing with Section 22010) shall enact an informal bidding ordinance to govern the selection of contractors to perform public projects pursuant to subdivision (b) of Section 22032. The ordinance shall include all of the following:

- (a) Notice to contractors shall be provided in accordance with either paragraph (1) or (2), or both.
 - (1) The public agency shall maintain a list of qualified contractors, identified according to categories of work. The minimum criteria for the development and maintenance of the contractor's list shall be determined by the commission. All contractors on the list for the category of work being bid shall be mailed, faxed, or emailed a notice inviting informal bids unless the product or service is proprietary. All mailing of notices to contractors pursuant to this subdivision shall be completed not less than 10 calendar days before bids are due.
 - (2) The public agency may elect to mail, fax, or email a notice inviting informal bids to all construction trade journals specified in Section 22036.
- (b) The notice inviting informal bids shall describe the project in general terms and how to obtain more detailed information about the project, and state the time and place for the submission of bids.
- (c) The governing body of the public agency may delegate the authority to award informal contracts to the public works director, general manager, purchasing agent, or another appropriate person.
- (d) If all bids received are in excess of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000), the governing body of the public agency may, by adoption of a resolution by a four-fifths vote, award the contract, at two hundred twelve thousand five hundred dollars (\$212,500) or less, to the lowest responsible bidder, if it determines the cost estimate of the public agency was reasonable.

Capitol Update

Easing port congestion was the focus of an executive order signed by Governor Gavin Newsom last week and a federal partnership announced this week.

The executive order signed by the Governor on October 20 directs state agencies to develop longer-term proposals that support port operations and goods movement for consideration in the January 10 Governor's Budget. The executive order builds on earlier efforts this year by the Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development (GO-Biz) to ease supply chain issues by engaging the diverse network of stakeholders along the supply chain to discuss key challenges and identify short-term and long-term solutions. These directives come amid global disruptions to the goods movement supply chain. Record demand for imported goods combined with capacity issues across the entire supply chain have slowed distribution at ports on the California coast. The executive order also directs state agencies to continue coordinating with the Biden-Harris Administration Supply Chain Disruptions Task Force to address state, national and global supply chain challenges. Lastly, under the order, state agencies are directed to identify state-owned properties and other locations that could be available to address short-term storage needs once goods are unloaded from ships; to identify priority freight routes to be considered for a temporary exemption to current gross vehicle limits to allow for trucks to carry additional goods; and to create workforce training and education programs. AB 639's (Cervantes, 2020) implementation is also expedited through this executive order.

Partnership

A joint release from the Governor's office and USDOT identifies projects that could receive support from the partnership agreement as including:

- Port-specific upgrades;
- Expanding capacity for freight rail;
- Developing inland port facilities for increased warehouse storage;
- Railyard and truck electrification;
- Highway upgrades to improve truck travel times;
- Grade-separated crossings to reduce the number of rail-street intersections and improve safety and efficiency;
- Land ports of entry to expand trade capacity and cross-border commerce; and
- Other projects identified by the California State Transportation Agency.

Railroad steps up efforts to ease West Coast port congestion, a move that could help get goods to construction sites faster Union Pacific Railroad Co. has ramped up efforts to alleviate congestion at the Port of Long Beach near Los Angeles with new incentives for weekend container dropoffs and adding capacity as needed to support the West Coast port's move to encourage shippers to move cargo via rail instead of truck. The railroad is offering a \$60 refund for every container ingated over the weekend until the end of the year, according to a statement last week. Union Pacific recently expanded its hours to align with the Long Beach port's 24/7 schedule in an effort to ease congestion. Union Pacific also said it will add capacity "as needed" to support a joint initiative from the Port of Long Beach and Utah Inland Port Authority, encouraging shippers to send cargo destined for intermountain states to Salt Lake City by rail, according to an emailed statement from railroad spokesperson Kristen South. That capacity could be in the form of longer or new trains, South said.

Payroll employment rises by 531,000 in October; unemployment rate edges down to 4.6%

Total nonfarm payroll employment rose by 531,000 in October, and the unemployment rate edged down to 4.6 percent. Job gains occurred in leisure and hospitality, in professional and business services, in manufacturing, and in transportation and warehousing. Public education lost jobs.

OSHA's new COVID vaccine standard: What contractors need to know

Employers with 100 or more employees will need to implement a COVID-19 vaccination requirement for their employees — and offer a weekly testing alternative to those who refuse or are unable to receive a vaccine — by Jan. 4, 2022, according to an emergency temporary standard issued Thursday by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration. In determining whether they meet the 100-employees threshold, employers must include all employees across all of their U.S. locations, regardless of employees' vaccination status or where they perform their work, per the ETS. Part-time employees do count towards the company total, but independent contractors do not. Additional sections of the ETS detail how the threshold should be determined in situations involving

franchisees, multi-employer workplaces and staffing agencies. All covered employers are required by the ETS to bear the cost of providing up to four hours of paid time and reasonable paid sick leave needed to support vaccination, but where an employee chooses to remain unvaccinated, the ETS does not require employers to pay for the costs associated with regular COVID-19 testing or the use of face coverings. Some employees may be entitled to reasonable accommodation from their employer, absent undue hardship, due to a medical condition or sincerely held religious belief. Stakeholders have until 30 days after the date of the rule's publication to submit public comments.

Federal contractor vaccine mandate draws more litigation

The Biden administration's COVID-19 vaccination mandate for federal contractors is facing a lawsuit in which Texas alleges the requirement runs afoul of the Constitution. A separate lawsuit filed by 10 states, led by Missouri and Nebraska, alleges that the mandate is unconstitutional and violates several federal laws. Full Story: CNN

Economists had forecast increased construction spending for September, but the Commerce Department reported a decline of 0.5% from the previous month. The September total, however, was up 7.8% from a year before, although material shortages prevented a bigger gain. Full Story: Reuters

Construction starts expected to ease in 2022

Total construction starts will rise to \$946 billion next year from this year's \$893 billion, slowing to a 6% increase after a 12% year-to-year gain in 2021, according to Richard Branch, chief economist at Dodge Construction Network. Unemployment Insurance Claims

Initial claims within California rose 4.2% during the week of October 30, while claims in the rest of the country continued their longer-term decline, dropping 5.1%. The

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seasonally adjusted number of claims dropped 4.9% for the US as a whole. In all, California continued to perform below the rest of the US, with 25.9% of all initial claims processed during the week. This performance would indicate a continued slowing in California's recovery pace compared to the rest of the nation as reflected in the recently released job and employment numbers for September. California claims remained at levels previously seen in July and August 2021, with essentially level numbers over the past 5 weeks. The US number was again the lowest since the beginning of the pandemic period and only 12% above the average in 2019. California was 54% above the 2019 average

Construction begins on 100 MW solar farm in Calif.

Construction is underway on the 100-megawatt Rabbitbrush Solar project in Kern County, Calif. The project, led by general contractor McCarthy Building, includes 50 megawatt-hours of battery storage capable of providing 2½ hours of power in a bid to improve grid reliability.
